1. Settings and Access

Guelph, a city of 80,000, is situated approximately 80 kilometres northwest of Toronto. The University of Guelph is situated on the southern side of Guelph and has a student population of over 10,000 students.

Guelph is served on a regular basis, by both train (VIA Rail) and bus (Gray Coach) services from Toronto. There is road access to border crossing points at Detroit/Windsor and Niagra. Toronto's Pearson International Airport is located 45 minutes from campus and connections can be made with Red Car Service, a local shuttle bus service. Red Car charges \$15.00 (one way) and is paid to the driver. Should you require this service, please provide the information as requested on the registration form.

2. Accommodation

On-campus accommodation is available in comfortable student residences; both single and twin rooms, all with shared washroom facilities. Accommodation and meals are sold as a package on the basis of the American Plan. The package includes: 3 nights accommodation, 3 breakfasts, and 3 lunches; based on single occupancy \$88.50 (Canadian), and twin occupancy U.S. \$79.50 (Canadian) per person. Package prices can be adjusted for early or late arrivals or departures. Payment is due upon arrival, cash or cheques in Canadian funds.
